

April 2000 – Larry Williams and Cindy Goree begin teaching basic shag dance on the Virginia Peninsula.

April 2001 – The stat of weekly shag dance lessons at Mitty's (was in what is now Holiday Inn at I-64 and J. Clyde Morris Blvd). A dance club is beginning to form.

December 2001 – It's official, Colonial Shag Club becomes a reality. Jay Magness is the club's first president.

June/July 2002 – Milestone moment: CSC is now 100 members (dancers) strong.

September 2002 – Colonial Shag Club was accepted into the Association of Carolina Shag Clubs.

March 2003 – Colonial Shag Club receives its charter (i.e., registered as a corporation in Virginia). "Business as usual" is the norm.

April 2003 – CSC adopts its official club logo, selected by a contest. Contest winner – Harry Walthall.

October 2011 – Fast track and Wow, Colonial Shag Club is celebrating ten years. So much has happened over those first years. What does the future have in store for our club?

Above, I've shown only a very, very small snapshot of the inception of our club. A lot of work from many, many people went into forming, nurturing, and growing our club over the years. Memories created through all the events planned and attended (including a world record breaking event). Contests entered (with winners at all levels, I might add). And of course, lifelong friendships created. Now in 2023, after twenty-one years of "shagging to the music," it's no different than the past. It still takes involvement from our members to continue to nurture and grow our club. To our new members and "experienced" members, I encourage you to become involved. ### What is SOS?

Founded in 1980, the Society of Stranders (SOS) is an organization that perpetuates the traditions of beach music and shag dancing. "Stranders" has to do with North Myrtle Beach being situated on a stretch of beach known as the Grand Strand.

In 1989, the Association of Carolina Shag Clubs (ACSC) took over managing the SOS organization and still manages it today.

SOS is widely recognized for organizing two yearly adult parties, Spring Safari and Fall Migration, held in North Myrtle Beach. People go to these events to have fun, enjoy the beach, see old friends, and to make new ones. What started as a small reunion of friends is now attended by thousands.

Both yearly SOS events are ten days in length and encompass the majority of the local lounges in the Ocean Drive/Main Street area of North Myrtle Beach. Inside these participating lounges, bands and deejays play shag tunes. It is non-stop fun from early in the day until the wee hours of the morning.

Each SOS event includes special activities like dance workshops, contests, live entertainment, a parade in the Spring, and "Fun Sunday" and "Fun Monday" in the Fall. Fun Sunday and Fun Monday each consist of three bands playing sequentially on a temporary stage set up near the intersection of Ocean Drive and Main Street. Moreso than being about organized happenings, SOS is people doing their own thing on their own schedule — meandering through the numerous dance clubs (in walking distance from each other) and partying in hotel rooms

In buying an SOS card, you are buying a membership in SOS for one calendar year. And the card gives you free access to the dance clubs during an SOS event.

# A party of one, a table for two or more

In transitioning from a
"couple" self-identity to a
"single" identity, being
confronted with tables for two or

more when entering a restaurant alone can be intimidating. I was in that stage in year 2005 when I started taking shag dance lessons hosted by Boogie on the Bay Shag Club at the Holiday Inn on the Portsmouth waterfront (hotel has since been demolished). Rudy was one of my classmates at that time, and he too was at that stage in life after his bride of 57 years passed away in 2004. He was 80 years old at that time — 80 years old and starting a new chapter in life. The ending of the previous chapter was written for him, not in a way that he would have chosen. He penned this new chapter.

For shag dance lessons, one does not have to bring a partner. Many people don't. The shag dance lesson

structured in such a way so as to get rid of the intimidation. It does not take long for a party of one to be greeted by tables of two or more instead of being

"confronted." And from there, the

participants can more comfortably go to their first shag dance social, having enough skill to enjoyably

dance and possibly attend with new friends from the classes.

Once in the shag community, Rudy met Laverne who was already shag dancing. Rudy married LaVerne. And the chapter continues with Rudy and LaVerne enjoying each other's company and enjoying fellowship with others in the shag community. This chapter

continued until 2017 when LaVerne passed away.

Rudy passed away in July of 2023 at the age of 97. Rudy was active in the community. An excerpt from his obituary is "He was a Past Master of South Norfolk Masonic Lodge #339, Past District Deputy Grand Master of the 36th Masonic District, Chaplain of South Norfolk #339 for many years, a Khedive Shriner and member of the Khedive Autos."

LuVerne passed away in April of 2017 at the age of 86. Besides having a charming personality, LaVerne was known for often wearing a colorful hat. An excerpt from LaVerne's obituary is "Most knew her to be donning a beautiful hat and shagging on the dance floor. 'I'd rather dance than eat,' she'd often say. A member of the Red Hat Club, LaVerne's positivity and energy fueled a life in motion in which she was also a real estate maven, piano lover, quilter and bank wizard with a keen sense of style."

This story is an advertisement for the value of the shag dance environment. At the age of 80, Rudy ventured out and, as a result, enriched his life with help from the shag dance community. Such a story rings true for many other people. At first intimidated by a table for two or more, getting into the shag community can easily result in finding a table for two or more with the other chairs occupied by friendly smiles. With many of the newcomers being widows and widowers who are finding their way through a grieving process, the shag dance environment offers a haven for a 'single' who is looking for fellowship and activity.

#### Introduction to Brennar Goree

Concerning the letter from Brennar Goree in the right column, those who came into the shagging community in the last few years may not be familiar with him. So, introduction is given here.

Brennar Goree, is the son of Cindy Black, is now 33 years old, grew up in Virginia Beach, and grew up with Colonial Shag Club Saturday night socials as part of life. In years 2003 through 2010, those who attended the socials and read the newsletter saw his dance skills first hand and read about his achievements in dance competitions. Year after year, as junior shagger, he competed at national dance competitions, such as the US Grand Nationals Dance National Dance Championships in Atlanta, Georgia and the US Open Swing Dance Championships in Burbank, California. Both of these events had shag and swing dance categories for adults and juniors. Brennar always placed in the junior shag and junior swing dance categories, more often than not taking first place.

Brennar no longer lives in Hampton Roads. He moved away in 2009 to California, later to North Carolina, and then to Florida where he resides now.

The Colonial Shag Club Saturday night social attendees back in those days were periodically treated to mingling with and watching the dancing of skilled junior shaggers from the Hampton Roads area — including Brennar, Justin Poston, Chelsea (Hornberger) Williams, and Kim Myers. Justin, near in age to Brennar, also competed in the juniors category in the US Grand Nationals and took first place more than once.

Brennar has traveled the world, sowing seeds of shag and swing dancing. This includes Moscow and Australia to name a few.

The following is an introduction to Berta Lull, who is mentioned in the letter, Berta Lull, who passed away in 2022, resided in Virginia Beach. She founded the National Living Legends of Dance. Berta was inducted into the Beach Shag Hall of Fame in 1996.

## **SUBJ: LETTER OF THANKS TO VIRGINIA** 20 July 2023

Fellow Virginians,

Considering the recent nomination into the National Living Legends of Dance (NLLD), I wanted to take a moment to express my sincerest gratitude to those across the state who impacted my life over the years. I will write a formal letter to deliver for NLLD, but I wanted to first rewind and thank the Virginia Shaggers Hall of Fame and the Shag Clubs across the state for making all this possible for our family. To say I am honored and humbled to receive recognition from the Virginia Shaggers Hall of Fame would be a vast understatement. No words can fully convey my appreciation and thanks. Lord knows I could not have said all of this or probably held it together on the mic, so I wanted to take the opportunity to show my appreciation to you all.

First, thank you to Ms. Joyce Burnley for having the initial vision to create an outlet to honor those junior shaggers in Virginia who have played an integral role in growing our dance. I loved getting the opportunity to enter the Virginia Junior Hall of Fame alongside such an incredible group of people. They are my brothers and sisters, my previous dance partners, my mentors, and my long-time friends.

Thank you also to Mr. Steve Booth for always leading and speaking with such class and charisma. Your introductions for everyone going in were well thought out, elegant, and delivered with thoughtful intent that honored each inductee in the most meaningful and unique way. Bravo, sir! That said, I am certain Ms. Janis also plays a vital role in your planning and preparation and her class is always unmatched. Thank you *both* for your kindness, support, and consistent contributions to our state and the dance over the years. Berta would be proud of the example you continue to set.

Thank you to the Shag Clubs who provided a means for me to grow in my dancing and teaching through the years. I can honestly say, the Shag Clubs in Virginia played a huge role in my growth and development as an inspiring dance professional. You all gave me a means to dance and connect with people that did not require my mother having to drive to the Carolinas only to progress. For that, we are forever grateful, and it is worthy depicting my journey with each of the clubs.

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I first started in group classes at Steppin' Out in Virginia Beach with Larry and Cathy Williams where I met my soon to become stepfather Larry and longtime friends, the late great Mr. Bill Williams and his beautiful and talented wife Steva. I also met Grant, Ginger, and the Poston's, Ms. Jan, Fran, Jackie, and many others over the years who all treated me like family. So close to home many of my fondest memories took place in Virginia Beach. I attended the National Living Legends of Dance hosted by the late Berta Lull in '99 with my Nana at the Officers Club in Little Creek. Berta would go on to adopt me like a son and support me beyond measure as I grew up. In fact, years later, she even invited my Junior Shag Dance Team to perform as a dress rehearsal every year before U.S. Open. Thank you for your support, Virginia Beach!

Boogie on the Bay Shag Club also provided a location just a short drive away from us to go Shagging. I remember going there to drill my footwork with Fran Harris, Marsha, Tom, and Cathy, learn line dances and work on my boogie walk. I'll never forget going to the Chamberlain, taking from Jac and Erin and dancing under the moonlight overlooking the Chesapeake Bay. What a party, too ... of course only Cokes and Shirley Temples at that time! Thank you, Boogie on the Bay!

Just a short drive over the Hampton Roads Tunnel and we landed at Colonial Shag Club thanks to the initial start fueled by the late Sterling Nichols and his wife Dottie. Over the years, Colonial Shag Club became like home where I helped with the weekly lessons at Mitty's, did homework, ate brick oven pizza, deejayed with Larry and Jerry Hardy, worked on spins and footwork with Tim Miller and snuck off upstairs to prepare for competitions with Justin and Cati. I would talk about life with Dottie and Sterling, Harry and Camille, Tim and Janet, and the list goes on... Thank you, Colonial shag Club!

As we moved Northwest, we landed in Richmond where I often practiced with my first Nationals partner, Amanda Tedesco, and even competed in many CSA contests there over the years. To this day, I'm still close with many people in the area. Thank you, Richmond!

As a teenager, a club called Battlefield Boogie formed and Don, Audrey, Graig and Heather trusted me to teach their first out-of-towner workshop. I remember the step I taught to this day and thought how proud I felt to get the opportunity to travel and teach in my own state. I even remember getting some gas money for the mustang, too! Thank you, Battlefield Boogie!

I remember countless trips to Northern Virginia to the Northern Virginia Shag Club. My mom navigated D.C. traffic to get me to the dances, but it was worth the four hour drive every time. I would practice with Kari Jones, make up steps with Vesta, Vaughn and Cathy, Joan and countless others who supported me and afforded us a place to dance. Thank you, Northern Virginia!

There are clubs now in the state that continue to carry on the dance we love. I salute you. Without your sacrifice and commitment, opportunities would not exist for young dancers like me. Without clubs, I most likely would have never entered the competitive Shag arena. From the bottom of my heart, thank you all.

To my family, without you, there is no me. My dad, Nana, stepfather Larry and my mother would drive me up and down the road, bought me countless loafers, clothes to match partners in competitions, funded lessons/coaching, and encouraged me to do my best. Perhaps the most valuable lesson they taught me was to be gracious for the wins *and* the losses and provided their shoulder when I needed it most.

Last, but certainly not least... Mom, your tireless devotion to me and unconditional love and support is beyond words. The dance, our family and I are extremely blessed to have you in our corner continuing to pour your energy into all of us. You would practice with me in the garage for hours and hours. You would take my dance videos away when I was grounded, you encouraged me to learn all dance forms, gave me opportunities to teach, and even traveled the world with me paying it forward. This award is just as much yours as it is mine. I certainly would not be the dancer or the man I am without you. I love you, Mom.

Thanks you all again for all the priceless memories and all the love and support for the last 25 years. I am forever in your debt.
